Riccall Village

Design Statement

A new group has formed to update the existing Village Design Statement (VDS) and members have been busy assessing housing styles and putting reports together so that the Riccall VDS can be as accurate as possible. The idea of a VDS is that all potential new build within Riccall has to adhere to adopted guidance, which comments on the general character

of streets and areas within the village. Selby DC is working with the Council to bring the guide up to date and produce a new document. If you want to be involved in this process, which is in its very early stages, get in touch.

Recreational Progress

You may have noticed that some work has happened at the park, within the last few weeks. New and bigger litter bins have been added, as this was becoming a problem. The area next to the skate park has been strimmed back and shaped into humps for BMX riders.



The skate park underwent some art work during the October half term, when members of Riccall Youth Club worked with a graffiti artist to create new art and repaint some of the work done last year. Well done to the young people who got involved in this. The

Beacon at the park is about to be re-painted and a new sign will be erected.

Five Parish Councillors and the Clerk attended a one day course provided by the Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents, which was really useful and will help to further develop our maintenance programme.

The junior football project is underway, with further details becoming available in the Spring Riccall Beacon—watch this space.

Finally, we would like to wish you a very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

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Emergency Planning

Riccall Parish Council needs to update the existing emergency plan, which would be used to work in partnership with the Emergency Services should an appropriate situation arise in Riccall.

We are looking for residents that would be interested in helping us to update the plan early in 2010.

A focus group will be asked to look at the project and work with Councilors to ensure that our emergency plan has real community involvement. Residents who have worked within the Emergency Services either currently or in the past would be particularly welcome on the group, as would anyone with knowledge of emergency planning in general and those eager to help out in an emergency situation. Please do get in touch if you are able to help.

Traffic management



The previous quarter has seen a focus on correspondence and meetings around the subject of traffic management in Riccall. Senior NYCC Highways officers have met with the Clerk and Chairman to take forward initiatives and the council has pressed for action.

NYCC has now finally agreed to trial a vehicle activated sign on Main Street, near to the park and based on the results of this, will hopefully allow Riccall PC to purchase a permanent sign. Recent speed surveys have taken place on Main Street, York Road and Kelfield Rd and the results of these will be evaluated in November.

Residents have complained about two other areas in Riccall. The junction of Back Lane and Main Street is a problem with regard to visibility, due to parked cars. Also, the traffic light end of Station Rd is experiencing problems with parking, deliveries and general congestion.

NYCC has agreed to look carefully at both sites and come back to the council with ideas and solutions. We will keep you informed about these areas.

Sad goodbye to former Councillor



Members were very sad to hear of the recent death of former Riccall Parish Councillor, Herman Baarda. Herman served on Riccall Parish Council for many years, and always held a particular interest in making the village look attractive through initiatives like 'Riccall in Bloom.'

Council Vacancy - do you fancy joining us?

Due to the resignation of Cllr Lily Wilson, we now have one casual vacancy on Riccall Parish Council. So do you think you could fill the gap?



What does it take to be an effective Councillor?

As a minimum, there is a commitment to attend at least 17 full and committee meetings a year on a Monday evening; but there should be a much greater involvement in order for the Council to be proactive and progressive. There are many formal and informal meetings to be attended outside of normal Council meetings, numerous papers to be read and ad hoc and regular jobs to be done, such as distributing the Beacon, planting bulbs and helping to check the play equipment! It can be a frustrating job when you are trying to get organisations and people to do the jobs they are responsible for; but it can be rewarding when things you have been pressing for are achieved and when the occasional praise comes your way.



What's in it for us?

We ask only that you want to serve the community of Riccall and have the best interests of our village at heart. We would hope that you have some experience and skills to share or maybe just lots of enthusiasm! Riccall Parish Council is non-political and concerned only with the community of Riccall.

What's in it for you?

We would provide training for you in order to develop your new role. The job is voluntary without any payment. There is a small Cllrs allowance available each year for those that choose to claim it, in order to cover your expenses. It is a very satisfying role and one that matters a great deal. You would be representing the electorate of Riccall and working towards improving your own community.



Are there any conditions?

Not many. To become a Riccall Parish Councillor, you need to be an elector of Riccall or have your main place of work in Riccall. You need to be over 18 years of age and not be a paid employee of Riccall Parish Council. You cannot become a Parish Councilor if you have been declared bankrupt, unless the debts are paid in full or the bankruptcy becomes annulled or discharged. Some rules apply about criminal convictions and it would be worth speaking privately to the Clerk about that, if you are interested in becoming a Councillor.

Riccall Parish Council would like to actively encourage all residents to become more involved in the Council.



You would be made very welcome and would be contributing significantly to your own community.

Times are moving on and the council plans to re-launch the website shortly. For the time being continue to access




Recipe Corner - Ice Cream Christmas Pudding

For an alternative to traditional Christmas pudding...try this...

Ice Cream Christmas Pudding—serves 10



- 50g toasted almonds,
- 45g mixed peel
- 80g raisins (chopped),
- 80g sultanas
- 50g currants,
- 80ml rum
- 1 litre good quality vanilla ice cream
- 105g red and green glace cherries (quartered)
- 1 teaspoon mixed spice,
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1 litre good quality chocolate ice cream




- 1 Mix the almonds, peel, raisins, sultanas, currants and rum in a bowl, cover with plastic wrap and leave overnight. Chill a 2 litre pudding basin in the freezer overnight.
- 2 Soften the vanilla ice cream slightly and mix in the glace cherries. Working quickly, press the ice cream around the inside of the chilled basin, spreading it evenly to cover the base and side of the basin. Return basin to freezer and leave overnight. Check the ice cream a couple of times and spread it evenly.
- 3 The next day, mix the spices and chocolate ice cream with the fruit mixture. Spoon it into the centre of the pudding bowl and smooth the top. Freeze overnight or until very firm. Turn the pudding out onto a chilled plate and decorate. Cut into wedges to serve.

Best of all no heating up or custard necessary!

7 days to think — beware of bogus callers

Over recent days there have been 'bogus tradesmen' cold calling and targeting properties within Selby district.

There is specific legislation referring to doorstep selling, if the service being offered costs over £35:-

You must be given a **7DAY** cooling off period, within which you can cancel

the contract.

You must be given a written quote for the work, with the full name and address of the company displayed on the quote.

The work carried out must be of a satisfactory standard and the price charged reasonable for the work carried out.

If you have had any work that has contravened any of this legislation, do not hesitate to contact North Yorkshire Police or Trading Standards.

Winter 'Nature Watch' in Riccall



Winter reminders. Keep a supply of nuts/grains in your garden feeder for Tits, Finches, Sparrows and Robins. They depend on you to survive the winter and remember to put out clean water daily. Leave unwanted Apples/cores in a corner of the garden as Black-birds, Thrushes and migrant Redwings and Fieldfare here from Scandinavia for the winter, all enjoy them. Wildlife survival in winter can often depend on you.

"Add nature to your Christmas list this year and treat your garden to a bat box or bird nest box / feeder."

All of our summer migrating birds have left and you've probably seen Geese flying overhead in a V formation, seeking our wetlands after summering in the Arctic. Colonies of birds settle in **Wheldrake Ings national nature reserve** and create a spectacle that is worth observing from one of the many hides. Stroll in **Skipwith Common** along the boardwalk, through the Pine trees to the raised hide and view water birds on the ponds – remember your binoculars.

Work in Northfield by Riccall Lands Charity continues with re-planting of a hedge, replacing some trees in the new wood and surfacing of the access to the cycle path. Information boards will be erected on the Green, Wood & Meadow. Your help on Saturday mornings is vital so please do ring Paddy on 249201 for details. Work starts from 10am on Saturdays from December 7th for a couple of hours weekly. Completing Northfield Breathing Places balances some of the loss of natural habitats to new buildings and intensive farming. **It improves biodiversity in the village and meets Selby District Council's target of creating local community wildlife space.**



I was surprised when out walking one evening by a young Fox scampering in and out of gardens along York Road –it seemed bewildered by our array of waste bins or maybe had lost its way? Sadly an adult fox was the victim in a later road accident near to the Chapel.
